Joliet 2005 Recap

Over the past few years, Squadron 4 has been extremely lucky when it came to the weather on the date of the annual BBQ/fly-in. Due to the very nature of aviation events, weather is an overall decisive factor regarding the success of that event. Not only the weather at the location of the event, but weather conditions in the vicinity of and along the route of incoming aircraft.

Despite the threatening weather, several brave pilots brought planes from some far distances. The Indiana Aviation Museum of Valparaiso, Indiana brought in their T-28, T-34 and T-6, flown by Jim Reed, Cathy Harrell, and Kris Kortokrax. Sam Tabor brought in his L-5 from East Troy, Wisconsin. Brian Olofsson brought his Stearman from Kankakee, Illinois. Vic Kraus brought his beautiful SNJ, Roger Paykert brought his N2S-5, Bob Fitzpatrick brought his newly cleaned and waxed Yak-52, and then the lite rain started (Bob, don't you know the same rules apply to airplanes as cars, you wash and wax it and it rains). Tom Buck's TBM and Keith Birsa's PT-17 didn't have to travel to the event (being hangared on the airport), nevertheless, they flew the airplanes thrilling the crowd and attracting a lot of attention.
